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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2020

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

The charity's objects are:

To promote the benefit of the inhabitants of Barnes ("the neighbourhood") without distinction of sex, race, political, religious or other opinions, by fostering a sense of community in the neighbourhood and bringing together the inhabitants, the local authorities and voluntary associations in a common effort to:

(1) advance education and to provide facilities for recreation and leisure-time occupations, in the interests of social welfare, and with the object of improving the conditions of life in the neighbourhood;

(2) promote the preservation, development and improvement, for the public benefit, of the character and amenities of the neighbourhood; and,

(3) establish a Community Centre ("the Centre") and acquire, maintain and manage, either alone or in cooperation with others, the centre for activities promoted by the CIO and its members in furtherance of the above objects. The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2020

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

2020 has been a challenging year for the whole world with the first global pandemic for over 100 years, due to the pandemic we have not been able to hold the Fair or the Food Fair, and this has had a major impact on our fund raising, our income for 2020 is only 55% of 2019. However we have still managed to contribute to our community and continued to support, the Children's Literature Festival, St Marys Scouts, OSO Arts and the Barnes Film Festival. We have managed to obtain an electric delivery bike to support home deliveries and this can be used by any local business, it is currently being used mainly by the newly rebranded "Barnes Pantry".

Our newsletter Prospect has gone to a quarterly publication and our electronic version Prospect Plus has become our monthly newsletter to members, this follows the trend of society moving more online. We are aware that a fair few of our members may not have email / internet access and we are committed to keeping prospect in printed form, and in fact it has got a make over in recent months, and has been well received.

We have worked with LBRuT to put new signs and maps for Barnes and created many waiting points outside high demand shops, that was greatly needed during the lockdowns.

A new mural can be seen under Barnes Bridge, this was paid for by a single very generous donor.

The Green Bridge Project for Barnes Bridge is still underway but has been delayed due to the Pandemic.

Our green keeper has continued to work tirelessly during the year to keep the Pond and the Green looking as good as possible as these areas have proved to be vital to residents well being during lockdowns. He has continued to work on the Beverly Brook improvements.

(1) Improving the conditions of life in the neighbourhood

The BCA improves the conditions of life in the neighbourhood both through its own actions and through supporting the activities of local charities and not-for-profit organisations.

Rose House, a 17th Century building in the centre of Barnes, is the headquarters of the BCA and a centre for the community. It is staffed every day by the BCA staff and volunteers who welcome residents and visitors alike and offer them information and help. During term time mornings most of the rooms in the house are used by The BCA English School (a separate charity). The School provides education to some 200 students of 20 different nationalities during the course of a year. The building also hosts classes in other subjects and offers facilities for recreation and leisure-time occupations.

This year the BCA provided in total £5,150 of financial support to 12 other voluntary organisations that underpin the social fabric of the neighbourhood. We have sponsored events such as the Barnes Music Festival and Barnes Children's Literature Festival. We have made grants across a wide spectrum to organisations such as St Mary Barnes Scouts, Barnes Film Festival and OSO Arts. and many more organisations. Some of these have been involved with us in joint fundraising activities or have benefited from a contribution from the event because of their work to prepare and help make it happen.

Our quarterly publication, Prospect, is used to promote the events and activities of a whole range of voluntary organisations; regularly those of FiSH Neighbourhood Care, Barnes Community Players, Barnes Literary Society, OSO Community Arts Centre, The Friends of Barnes Common and London Wetland Centre. We actively also communicate via email to our members with Prospect+ which shares updates and notices regularly and during 2020 moved more communication to our members through email updates.

The BCA runs a number of fundraising events, some of which are sponsored in whole or in part by local businesses, which also generate real community spirit. We continued the successful fund-raising initiative, through the generous support of the Barnes Turkey Runners to raise money to cover the costs of the Christmas Day lunch which the BCA organises for those who would otherwise be alone on Christmas Day.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2020

The dementia friendly park area around the Barnes Pond area, which was the first dementia friendly park in the Richmond borough, is now well established and suits the area very well allowing people with dementia, and everyone, to enjoy the local area and benefits to their health and wellbeing that comes with being outdoors.

The BCA is very grateful for the support it receives from the local Council to help with these local initiatives.

(2) Preserving the character and improving the amenities of the neighbourhood

The quality of the buildings in Barnes and the low density of housing, together with large open spaces, are among the most enviable features of the area but need both constant protection and support. The views of the environment are represented to the BCA through Raphael Zachary-Younger, who is a Trustee. The inputs he shares have been particularly important in respect of the Hammersmith Bridge closure and working with the Council and TFL to ensure the community is as informed as possible about the planning and timescale of the closure.

We applied for and got a grant for an electric delivery bike to help with local deliveries during the Pandemic and has been used by a number of local businesses

There is a close association with the Friends of Barnes Common (FOBC), itself a charity, which is Richmond Council's official consul-tee on our Local Nature Reserve - over 50 hectares (100 acres) of Metropolitan Open Land. FOBC aims to preserve the character of the Common for future generations through conservation work and wildlife walks and talks, which includes looking after the Leg o' Mutton nature reserve.

We have also arranged for local volunteers to help out at the vaccination centre at Essex House, as at the date of this report Essex House has completed over 46,000 vaccines.

At the centre of Barnes is its Green with an ancient Pond. In 2001 Barnes Pond lost all its water. The BCA raised the funds for Richmond Council to restore the Pond. Concerned that it would not be adequately cared for in future, the BCA employs the Common Keeper (jointly funded by itself, Richmond Council and support where we can from local business) who works with the Council and its contractors to maintain Barnes Pond and the Green to a high standard that local people expect. The Pond is promoted and used as an educational resource by the Common Keeper.

In 2020, the role of the Barnes Town Centre Manager (TCM) (jointly funded with Richmond Council) had to respond to a different environment with the closure of Hammersmith Bridge in the first part of the year. This has meant finding new ways to encourage local residents to use local shops with initiatives such as "shop local". There has been positive response amongst the local shops and residents to these initiatives. During the year as well, the TCM worked closely with the Council on various initiatives including further work on the new playground at Suffolk Road (in conjunction with the Friends of Suffolk Road group created under the auspices of the BCA) and a pedestrian bridge at the White Hart Lane train crossing. Promoting Barnes as a "Great Day Out" was also launched to encourage footfall to the area.

We have been working with local community groups as the development of the area round Stag Brewery takes shape to ensure that local views are included in the final design decisions. This has been continued involvement in this to understand the impact following the Hammersmith Bridge closure. The BCA was delighted that after working with Atkins and DSDHA (an urban design consultancy) to submit a feasibility study into the future of the High Street to the Council that it has now been awarded a grant to progress with work.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2020

FINANCIAL REVIEW Statement on Public Benefit

In setting the above objects and managing its activities the Trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on Public Benefit.

Financial review

The financial review covers the year ended 31 December 2020 with the comparatives for a twelve-month period to 31 December 2019. Income for the period was £118,561 (2019: £207,273) of which £18,503 was income allocated to restricted funds. Total expenditure amounted to £125,821 (2019: £223,648) for the year.

The results for the period show an excess of expenditure against income of £7,260 (2019:£16,375).

It is the policy of the charity to aim for a break-even position on its regular charitable activities. The shortfall in the year was due to the fact that we could not run a number of events due to Covid-19.

The net Funds and cash position at the end of the period, though weakened, remain strong overall because of the asset held in Rose House and therefore the Trustees consider the overall financial position of the charity to be satisfactory due to receiving CJRS grant.

Policy on reserves

In considering their policy on reserves the Trustees have taken account of particular risks that they carry, which are:

- cancellation of Barnes Fair, which is the main fundraising event because of adverse weather;
- unplanned maintenance of the freehold property, Rose House, a 17thC listed building;
- inherent risks arising from employment contracts.

In view of these risks the Trustees consider it prudent to maintain reserves equivalent to at least six months of its current level of expenditure.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

FUTURE PLANS

A structural review led to reconstitution of the BCA as a CIO and that in turn gave the impetus to conduct a wide-ranging operational review which continues to be ongoing. We have a focus on increasing membership and looking at our marketing activities to do so to appeal to all the inhabitants of Barnes and, in particular to promote volunteering. We have increased our focus on social media to appeal to all members and to target prospective ones too. We are bringing more focus and attention to our strategy and five-year plan and how we can demonstrate the value of the BCA to the Barnes community to encourage them to become members and support events and as a consequence support local charitable requests the BCA receives. Focusing on how the BCA can more fully become and be seen as the hub of the community is a focus for 2021.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

There is a maximum of twelve trustees of which nine are elected by the membership. The elected trustees may nominate a further three trustees in order to bring additional skills and experience to the trustee board. At each AGM three of the elected trustees retire and all the nominated trustees retire.

At the 2020 AGM, Gary Smith, Shelina Begum-Parmar and Jo Dallal retire by rotation. Gary Smith and Shelina Begum-Parmar will not be standing for re-election. Jo Dallal will stand for re-election. Raphael Zacchary-Younger, Jenny Mackenzie and James Felix automatically retire, as Nominated Trustees, but may be re-nominated if invited and if they so agree.

The trustees normally meet ten times per year. The trustees appoint from amongst their number the officers - Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Hon. Treasurer and Hon. Secretary.

The Trustees who served the CIO during the year were are shown under the Reference and Administrative details section below.

At the trustees meetings trustees collectively reviewed the Charity Commission's Guidance (CC3) 'The Essential Trustee: what you need to know' as part of the induction for new trustees and as a refresher for existing trustees.

The CIO employs a small team of part-time staff supplemented by volunteers. We continue to engage with the membership and to communicate the achievements of the BCA to the inhabitants of Barnes through our database and our systems of communication including the new website and a social media presence. The BCA's monthly publication Prospect has continued to promote the BCA and keep its members informed about our activities. During the year two editions of Prospect are distributed to all the households in Barnes. We also now send out electronically Prospect + to further inform the membership on a monthly basis and have been reviewing how best to interact with our members through email and social media.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF PREPARING THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

INCOME

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be assessed reliably and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Assets for distribution are recognised only when distributed. Assets given for use by the charity are recognised when receivable. Stocks of undistributed donated goods are not valued for balance sheet purposes.

Grants receivable are recognised on a receipt basis.

Membership subscriptions are recognised when received. Subscription income received in advance is deferred.

Interest receivable is recognised when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably. This is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Income from fundraising activities is recognised in the period when earned. Income from advertisements is recognised when the booking is completed. Other income, including the sale of goods and services, is recognised on sale and on completion of the service.

EXPENDITURE

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Grants payable are payments made to third parties in the furtherance of the charitable objectives of the charity. Grant awards that are subject to the recipient fulfilling performance conditions are only accrued when the recipient has been notified of the grant and any remaining unfulfilled condition attaching to that grant is outside of the control of the charity.

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred. Expenditure on charitable activities include the costs of the fundraising and the events held for the community and the purpose of the charity and their associated support costs.

Expenditure includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Support costs represent indirect charitable expenditure including back office costs, finance, personnel and governance costs. Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support costs.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

EXPENDITURE

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulations and good practice. These costs include costs related to statutory audit and legal fees together with an apportionment of overhead and support costs

Governance and support costs relating to the charitable activities have been apportioned based on the usage of The Centre and its facilities.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

TAXATION

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

FUND ACCOUNTING

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

HIRE PURCHASE AND LEASING COMMITMENTS

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
